The Parish Council will use this time to see that the Royal Oak Inn, a Listed Building, receives any decorating and maintenance that is required. 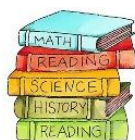
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Village Halls

Special thanks must go to Scout Leader Steve who organised the trip and fed us all so handsomely throughout.

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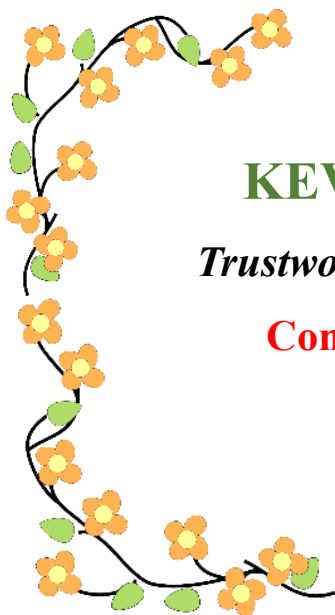

Featured Artist

This edition's featured artist is the multitalented Michelle Keith!



My name is Michelle Keith, and I am an artist local to Walkhampton. I work in multiple mediums, including Lino prints, pen and ink illustrations, and acrylics. I began my career with a degree in graphic design in the 80's. After my degree I created an illustration business, working on children's books and wedding invitations. I started my second degree in illustration in 2012. This was different for me, as my previous degree did not really involve technology. This meant I had to learn a new medium, as well as becoming technologically literate.

My first big commission was a map for the garden house in Buckland. This involved drawing species accurate diagrams of plants and trees so patrons could recognize them! Accuracy has always been very important to me in my work, as well as creating a sense of joy. I draw on my experiences as a mother and children's illustrator to characterize the things I paint. I want people to smile when they look at my work! Art brings me joy, and I want others to feel the same emotion.



After creating the map, I started doing more commissions. I discovered Lino printing in university and really enjoyed it. I took inspiration from great artists such as Picasso, who enjoyed working in multiple disciplines.

Lino printing also allowed me to take more private commissions. One I particularly enjoyed was a fifth wedding anniversary present. I created a four-layer Lino print of the couple's favorite tree.



I sold a lot on national trust sites and other local markets; this gave me the opportunity to display my work in Cotehele. Having a display in such a beautiful and historic place gave me a real sense of pride. From this, I gained a lot of commissions, and got to know the art market a bit better!

I really loved doing the markets, it allowed me to talk to others about my work and teach my friends how to design Lino prints. I am currently entertaining the idea of starting Lino print workshops locally if anyone would be interested! Any details of this will be posted in following editions of the Beacon.

One of my favorite commissions of my career is when I had the opportunity to create paintings for two doctors' waiting rooms. These are in Tavyside in Tavistock and Lifton surgery. One is a mural and the other is a triptyc painting.

The best thing about creating these paintings was hiding small surprises for children to find. I used the same technique when designing the map for the garden house. I put in small details such as birds, butterflies, and other animals for children to find while they are waiting. I was so happy to take on these commissions. As mother myself, of four boys, I understand how useful distractions in waiting rooms can be. I would love to do more of them, especially now I am a grandmother.

Autumn is upon us, and the race is on to clear the allotments of perennial weeds before winter. The allotments are a lovely place to be, even now that the days are drawing in and the weather is on the turn. This past growing season has been blooming wonderful, with everyone producing an abundance of fresh fruit and veg. This includes things such as runner beans, Swiss chard, cabbage, strawberries, squashes, and kale.



We chose not to enter the annual veg show this year, as it was our first year growing, but we plan to dominate the show next year. However, our little bloomer Ella created a beautiful scarecrow, called 'the recycled fairy'. She created this out of recycled materials such as cardboard, plastic, and tin cans. Thank you, Ella!

We also donated excess produce and homemade marrow chutney to the Walkhampton Saturday Market. Our chair, Helen France, spent the morning manning our stall and handing out fruit and veg to the masses. She was accompanied by Mary and Micheal Partridge, who kindly made homemade chutney for the occasion. We raised £64.80 from donations, and this will be put towards buying wildflower seeds for the allotment.



Nature is of the utmost importance to us, so we are trying to encourage biodiversity through a variety of plants, animals, fungi, and microorganisms. While working on the plots we look out for hedgehogs, particularly at dusk. The hot summer led to many hedgehogs having a second litter, so a lot of them are not ready to hibernate yet. A wildlife camera has been erected to capture all of the

goings on, hopefully we will have some exciting images to share in future bulletins.



We have added a special sign to our gate, also made by the multitalented Ella. You may also have noticed we have a wildlife garden award. We have achieved this through leaving longer patches of grass, cultivating a 'wet' area, using water butts, providing a bug hotel, and growing fruit trees.

New Years Day Wassail at Cornwood. What better way to start the new year with a Wassail? Meeting in the square in front of the Cornwood Inn at 3 pm & being treated to warm spiced mulled cider made from this seasons apple crop! Dartmoor Border Morris will be Morris dancing there before leading the crowd to the orchard for a Wassail. Muddy boots and noisy children are a must as we try and wake the apple trees from their slumber. More noise the better. Then back to the Cornwood Inn for a drink & music session.



Mummers play and Wassail, Buckland Abbey. Sunday 7th January. Dartmoor Border Morris return to the Great Barn for their traditional Mummers play. Acted out by a dozen merry actors telling the traditional story of how good overcomes evil in the form of Sir Francis Drake & his nemesis, King Philip of Spain. Helping him of course is a good doctor, Queen Elizabeth 1st, mother dolly & an old nag called Chatterley who likes to leave little presents all over the stage. This short play is suitable for all ages & starts around 1 pm. Much Morris dancing ensues in the courtyard followed by the Wassail in the great orchard. This being a National Trust property, normal entry fee`s apply.

Compton Vale Wassail, Saturday 13th January 6 pm till 9 pm. This is a community event held in Compton Vale involving live music, food stalls & Morris dancing around an orchard in lower Compton. Dartmoor Border Morris will be attending & helping the children, both big & small, bless the apple tree`s. Being a Wassail, anything that makes a noise to wake the apple trees will be most welcome. Dustbin lids & wooden spoons are a safe bet.

The Bere Ferrers Wassail will take place on Saturday 20th January. 6.30 pm. Dartmoor Border Morris were here back in October for the apple day & now are pleased to be involved in the Wassail too. 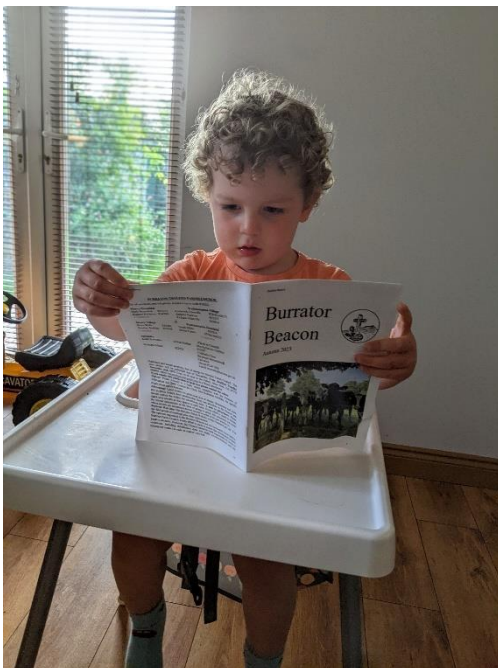


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Starting them young

Update from South West Lakes



South West Lakes is an independent charity dedicated to caring for and enhancing the region's reservoirs and lakes, including Burrator Reservoir. Tim Burton is the Environment and Engagement Ranger for Dartmoor, based at Burrator.



Managing invasive species

Volunteers have been removing the extremely invasive parrot's feather *Myriophyllum aquaticum* from a pond in Bal Mine car park at Burrator. Parrot's feather is an emergent plant that grows above and below water with 4-6 whorls of leaves that resemble a bird's feather. This plant grows quickly and forms dense clumps throughout the water column that block out light for other aquatic plants. This leaves less opportunities for aquatic invertebrates, negatively impacting our native ecology. Parrot's feather spreads through fragmentation so even the smallest fragment can propagate a new cluster.

Volunteers had to be extremely careful when digging out this plant, ensuring that no fragments were spread on their boots, tools or to the nearby car tyres. Tarpaulins and dumpy bags were used to isolate the plant where it could be carefully transported to a charcoal kiln for burning. Tools and boots were sprayed and brushed before leaving the pond.

It will likely take many more attempts to fully remove this plant from this area but the volunteers have made an amazing start.

Longstone Orchard preparation

Volunteers cleared an area of bracken, scrub and willow regeneration on Longstone peninsula at Burrator. This site was once a historic orchard connected to Longstone Manor and the area is being prepared to be restored to an orchard



containing local, heritage fruit trees. Fruit trees are in short supply at Burrator, yet traditional ancient orchards are one of the most productive habitats for wildlife. They provide food and shelter for thousands of species and help to form a mosaic of different habitats and opportunities with nearby grassland, scrub, hedgerows, and woodland.

Volunteers used loppers, bow saws and bracken bashers to remove vegetation, pile up arisings, and clear the earth ready for fruit trees to be propagated in the near future. The area cleared is known to be used by slow worms and adders and the piled up arisings close to scrub areas will provide valuable over-wintering sites for reptiles and amphibians. A hibernaculum was also built in this area by digging a 2 x 2m square 50cm deep and using cuttings and arising to infill the pit, grading material from largest to smallest with the additional of rocks and pipes, to create dark chambers and crevices for all sorts of wildlife to take refuge over the winter.

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News from Meavy

What makes a village into a community? Obviously people, but Meavy has four institutions that help bind it together – a primary school, a church, a public house, and a parish hall.



Meavy Parish Hall is used by many local groups and others wanting to hire its comfortable and well-equipped space. Here you can learn about local history, meet fellow gardening enthusiasts, try out Morris Dancing, play table tennis, join a yoga group, hold wedding receptions, birthday parties, and wakes. There is also a monthly film night, usually on the first Friday of the month, where you can see popular films and enjoy the licensed bar.

All these activities bring the hall its essential income, needed to maintain and improve its facilities. This takes an amount of organisation. Meavy Parish Hall is managed by a small group of volunteers who are its trustees. Their sole purpose is to

make sure the hall remains a valuable and popular venue for everyone in the parish and beyond.

In times when many institutions are having to close their doors, we feel it is more important than ever to work together to keep it going. Could you spare a little time and energy to help? The committee meets once every three months to plan activities and decide on priorities for building maintenance and improvement. You might also be asked to help on the film night or at occasional celebration events, but it is not a taxing role!

What is needed is more people who care about their community and what it has to offer them. If this is you, and we really hope it is, send a message to us at parish.hall@meavy.org.uk and we will be in touch.

You could also just turn up at our next meeting – Tuesday December 5th at 7pm in the hall. Since starting to write this we seem to have lost one of the institutions – please don't let the Parish Hall go the same way!

Restoration of the Reredos and Altarpiece in St. Peter's, Meavy



“What is a reredos”, I hear you ask, and how does it differ from an altarpiece?

Thanks to Encyclopaedia Britannica I now know the answer myself. A reredos is an ornamental screen that is not directly attached to the altar but is affixed to the wall behind.

An altarpiece (retable from the French, or retablo in Spanish) is smaller than a reredos, standing either on the back of the altar itself or on a pedestal behind it. Well, I hope that makes things perfectly clear before we go on.

St. Peter's is graced by a very beautiful reredos which was installed as part of the general restoration of the church in 1884. It was erected partly as a memorial to the Rev.

John Abbott, rector of St. Peter's from 1831 to 1872, by his fourth wife at a cost of £180. This very elaborate High Victorian design by the renowned 19th century church architect John Dando Sedding depicts the Crucifixion, with Christ on the cross in the centre, Mary, and John to either side, themselves flanked by St Peter and St Paul. The statuary is surmounted by a highly decorated cornice structure with a central pinnacle, a screen of tracery, and a cantilevered canopy with angels over Christ's head (see photos).

It is this cornice which has suffered most from the ravages of time and the damp West Dartmoor climate and is in urgent need of repair. Dismantling the structure to achieve this will also allow repairs to be made to the main structure. There are two further benefits of the project besides restoring an important piece of church architecture. Firstly, a marble shelf on which the reredos sits, and which was never part of the original design will be removed. As a result the reredos will be lowered by about nine inches allowing far more of the beautiful stained glass in the east window behind the altar to be visible. Secondly, removal of the shelf together with moving the altar forward by about three feet will allow the presiding priest at our communion services to face the congregation from behind the altar during the preparation of the bread and wine. We feel that this will markedly improve our quality of worship during the Eucharist as currently the priests must stand with their back to the congregation during this part of the service which is far from ideal.



The restoration work will be undertaken by Orchard Stonemasons from Silverton, near Exeter and will take about two months with a planned start date of 24th January. The cost is £16,000. This has been a project with a long gestation period, the need for repairs first being noted in 2007. Since then we have been working towards raising this sum through a variety of fundraising events held at St. Peter's these past few years. We are also most grateful for generous grants towards the work from Devon Historic Churches Trust, Benefact Trust, Churches Conservation Federation and The Society of Antiquaries. Fundraising to achieve the full

amount required still goes on.
